The year 2024 is a very significant year in our history as it marks the Centenary of the Scow. The first boats went on sale in 1924 for the princely sum of £90. This gives some idea of inflation trends over the last 100 years! They were made of wood, of course, no GRP in those days. There will be celebratory events, most of which are being arranged by Yarmouth Sailing Club. Details included later in this Newsletter.

Meanwhile, the sailing season is in full swing, even though we are still waiting for the arrival of summer. It is not too long until the first of the Travellers' Trophy races, to be held at Beaulieu River Sailing Club. This is always a splendid event. Plans for the Annual Championships are well in hand; they will be held at Lymington this year. We are seeking to encourage more Junior entries, as these have tailed off in recent years. Any help from parents and grandparents in this respect will be greatly appreciated.

## DECISIONS FROM THE ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING.

Just over 20 members attended the 2023 AGM, which was held at the Royal Lymington Yacht Club. Nine resolutions had been presented to the Committee for discussion and there was a lively exchange of views before eight of them were passed and one left for further consideration. The ensuing changes to the Rules are as follows:

- 1. Previously, the Rules if taken literally specified that only owners of Lymington River Scows which remained identical to the building specifications (something which is necessary only if the scow is to be raced) would be eligible to be voting members of the LRSCA. The Association recognises that many Scow owners do not want to race and so the change to the rule allows anyone who has a Lymington River Scow but has in some way altered it to fit their purposes (e.g. adding a block for an outboard motor) is still eligible to be a voting member of the Association.
- 2. Cam cleats for the headsail are now allowed, as long as they are fitted in the same position as the original fairlead fitting.
- 3. In order to be absolutely accurate in our nomenclature, the word 'gaff' has been replaced by 'yard'.
- 4. The yard can now be made from carbon fibre reinforced epoxy resin, as well as the aluminium alloy and glass reinforced polyester which have previously been allowed.
- 5. The spars, with the exception of the whisker pole, shall be nominally circular in cross-section and fabricated from carbon fibre or aluminium alloy which shall be anodised and may be powder coated for protection, except that the gaff may be glass reinforced polyester resin moulded over a class approved mandrel.
- 6. Because the Association is not allowed to hold any assets apart from cash, it has been agreed that the other assets of the Association (such as the moulds for the boats) will be held on behalf of the Association by whosoever are Chairman and Vice Chairman of the Association at the time.
- 7. It was agreed that sending emails to members is a valid way of communicating with them. It is also valid to post documents on the website and then to email members to let them know that they can be viewed there.
- 8. The Committee updates all members details as and when they are communicated to it. It was agreed that the Committee, by using the contact details held by the Association at that time, will be deemed to have communicated properly even if these contact details are out of date. It is the responsibility of the individual members to update their contact details, via the Secretary, as necessary.

The full list of Committee members is published in the LRSCA Yearbook distributed to all members but is summarised here.

## PLANS FOR THE CHAMPIONSHIPS IN SEPTEMBER.

Plans for the LRSCA Championship to be held over the weekend of Saturday 7th and Sunday 8th September hosted by the Royal Lymington YC are well advanced.

The Notice of Race was published recently and includes the primary details that 5 races are planned with a discard if 4 or more are completed. 3 races are planned for Saturday with the remaining 2 on Sunday. Apart from the usual single and double handers, there will be prizes for juniors, masters and newcomers. As well as the racing, there will be a BBQ at the Club on Saturday evening with be live music. We will be sharing the Club with an 'Old Gaffers' dinner. Most appropriate! On Sunday after racing and before the prizegiving, there will be a tea laid on for all competitors. If previous years' experiences are anything to go, you won't need supper that evening....!

On the practical side, it is planned to offer a boat transport service for members of west Solent Clubs to help get their boats to/from Lymington. We have also reserved some Club owned Scows for use by visitors, principally those from Clubs outside the Solent. Space will be available for the storage of visitors bringing their own trailers.

And finally "Buy One Get One Free"! The previous Sunday, 1st September, is the Royal Lymington Scow Division's annual 'Figure of Eight Race' which is the Lymington leg of the LRSCA Travellers Trophy. This race circumnavigates Pylewell and Oxey Islands, part of the salt marsh system around the mouth of the Lymington River, forming an 8 shaped course. There will be separate classes for single and double handers. It's great fun and entry is free to members of the LRSCA. Members wishing to compete in both this race and the Championship may leave their boats and trailers in Lymington free of charge for the intervening week.

#### THE TREASURER WRITES:

#### Subscriptions

March is the Treasurer's busy time each year, closing the accounts for the previous 12 months, preparing the accounts for Independent Examination, setting up records for the next 12 months and receiving and logging the Membership subscriptions due on the First of March, these arrive as a flood followed by a trickle.

In February I sent out a reminder that subscriptions were due on 1 March, with the intent that Members should satisfy themselves that their Standing Orders were set correctly. Unfortunately, a number of Members jumped the gun and

immediately paid their subscription by Bank transfer. The second problem was that in most cases there was also a Standing Order in place, resulting in an over-payment of some subscriptions.

I am working through the lists to email Members who I think have over-paid to identify corrective actions. The preferred actions are to return the over-payment or convert the over-payment to a Donation to LRSCA funds. If, after two emails, there has been no response from the Member, then Donation will be assumed as the correct action.

In all, 204 subscription payments arrived on 1 March 2024, as required by the Constitution. Thank you. A further 51 payments were received before the end of March. This was the cut-off for compiling the Yearbook Members List. A further 14 subscription payment have been received since the end of March but these Members will not appear in the Yearbook this year.

Of course, each year Members join and Members leave. Where previous Members have not paid their subscription by the end of March then they are deemed as Lapsed Members. I have tried to contact these former members to confirm their membership status one way or the other. Re-instatement is simple, by paying the subscription!

How can the subscription process be improved? We all have a part to play:

- The Treasurer must be more precise in any message advising the subscriptions will soon be due and advise against paying subscriptions before 1 March!
- All Members can help by setting up, or checking, that their Standing Order is due to be paid on 1 March each year. If not paying by Standing Order then please make the payment as early in March as possible.

# Lymington - the joys of pottering in a scow. Jane Corden writes:

It was a sunny but fairly breezy 23rd of May when seven Scows from the RLymYC Scow Division set off in the direction of Keyhaven. After discussions on the slipway reefs were put in and plans made to sail through Crooked Lake and Oxey, hug the coast to keep out of the flooding tide and rendezvous with the Keyhaven fleet in the vicinity of Hawker's Lake. Three

support ribs, headed by Graham Neal and Melanie Ganley, accompanied the sailing group. The wind and sea proved kind, good speed was made



and we soon spied the lead Keyhaven Scow which was to be our guide. Eagle eyed Graham also spotted a seal which decided to make a quick exit. Once inside the shelter of the spit the combined fleet headed off down Mount Lake giving their support boats the slip as the depth decreased. It had been decided that there was

sufficient water for the Scows alone to make their way along the Northwest Passage so the support boats proceeded to the Harbour to moor up confident that the sailors could always get out and wade home through the mud. The sailors and support crew were joined by KYC members, and members of the division who had cycled or driven to join us. All enjoyed an excellent lunch of soup and sandwiches sat in the sun, before rejoining their preferred mode of transport for the return trip. A fast downwind leg back through Hawker's and Oxey saw the fleet return



swiftly to Lymington without incident, where they were met by the welcome sight of 'trolley dollies' John Evans and Allan Hill. Boats were recovered and crews mustered on the balcony for a well-earned drink and debrief in the sun. Thanks must go to Graham for planning and KYC for their hospitality, and we look forward to a return visit from Keyhaven in a few weeks' time.


